Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Bonneville ES serves 445 students enrolled in grades Pre-Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 64% Hispanic and 36% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 84% White, 12% Black, 0% Native, 2% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 2% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Natalie Stevens and Assistant Principal Etleva Zeqo. Bonneville ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include the following clubs:

- Academic Clubs Math Club, STEM Club, Media Hounds News Club and Chess Club
- Civic-Minded Clubs Safety Patrols,, Green Club, PAWSitive Power Club and K Kids Club
- Book Clubs Battle of the Books Club and the Harry Potter Book Club
- Fine Arts-based Clubs Bravo (music), Recorder Club and Art Club
- Fitness Clubs -Running Club
- Family Clubs All Pro Dads

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Bonneville ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2003 and the number of books per student is 24.6. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Bonneville ES does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Titlewise analysis shows that 60% of the titles are aged.
- The Fiction books have the lowest average age with the EASY section counts for half the books with an average age of 1996.

- In comparison to the analysis from last year, over 500 aged titles were weeded from the collection. Taking the amount of 62% to 60% of aged titles.
- Other items, such as globes and CD players were weeded from the equipment in the media center.
- The Reference classification in the area of non-fiction needs to be weeded. There are 50 items with an average of the year 1999.

In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking

In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.

Notes

- Over half the collection is aged with the average publication date of 2003. This needs to be improved.
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides 1,329 SORA titles and 1,108 Destiny eBooks, audiobooks and digital magazines.
- The EASY section accounts for over half the fiction section. However it has an average age of 1996 which skews the Fiction section age, and in the total age of the collection.

This is skewing the average age of the whole collection. Weed the audio/book kits. Look at extra copies, age and use. Weed the nonfiction section for age and damaged books.
	 Selection Priorities Continue to add more books to the Easy section that are current and diverse. Buy more Sunshine State Jr. books to add more award winning authors to the section. Continue to add more current biographies.
2024-2025	 Weeding Priorities Weed the nonfiction section which is half of the library's inventory Revisit weeding the Easy section for aged and damaged books. Revisit use of the audio/book kits. Weed where needed.
